## Chairman's Column

With easing of Covid restrictions and reasonable weather our restoration has powered ahead as you will see from the operations report in this issue.

With the number of new volunteers who have joined our ranks work parties spanning two full weeks have now become the norm and the task of organizing them has of course also grown.

Detailed planning by Tony and team leaders goes into what we are going to do leading on to what skills and machines will be needed. In addition, we must always ensure safety on site and have first aiders on the team at all times.

In addition, wherever possible we continue to plan work in small groups over several locations to enable social distancing as Covid is still with us.

All of this presents a huge organizational challenge and we are very grateful to Doug Pell who has just taken on this role.

Doug, a regular volunteer himself, is moving away from finance and

integrating work party planning and management into our White Fuse membership system in conjunction with Membership Secretary Peter Bird.



Our new working name “Wendover Canal Trust” and associated logos has now been launched as announced in our last newsletter – thanks are

due to Bob Wheal and the Marketing Group who have spent many hours finalizing the details. Our legal entity remains Wendover Arm Trust.

Our hope is that the working name Wendover Canal Trust will more clearly express our purpose as surveys showed that “Wendover Arm” is not well understood outside of canal boating circles. Our aim is to ensure the Canal is the focus for a wide range of leisure activities in our increasingly urbanized world, bringing broad public benefit to everyone.

We were very sorry to report the death of Clive Wilson, our treasurer since 2014, who passed away in September – a tribute follows this report on page 8.

As I write we are planning rewatering of the section between Bridges 4 & 4a now that CRT's hydrologist has visited and agreed our proposed method.

We will also need to carry out tests specified by CRT for any leakage once partial filling to an agreed depth has been done.

The process of flooding the section may take 2/3 weeks as water is let in at a slow and controlled rate. Once complete and tests done to CRT satisfaction we will plan an official opening for Spring 2022.

### **AGM 2021**

Our AGM at 2.30pm on Wednesday October 27th was once again conducted on Zoom as the Covid pandemic is still with us. We welcomed 34 people online, virtually as last year.

Whilst a detailed summary of our activities for the year to April 2021 was contained in our annual report published prior to the meeting, we showed more pictures to help

convey the huge progress made during the period. I am very grateful to our deputy chairman and webmaster Clive Johnson who helped to put this together. Clive has put in many long hours during the period in redeveloping our website which launched in November 2020.

As you can read from the operations report in this issue we are beginning to see the end of the current phase of works appearing over the horizon.



A summary of our financials was published in our last newsletter so I will not repeat here except to say that our accelerated restoration progress means we are spending more money on plant hire and materials more quickly.

We have redoubled our fund raising activities accordingly but still need considerable sums to complete the job – any help will be greatly appreciated.

We thank three council members who have now stood down from Council – Ben Grinsted, Leanda Richardson and Doug Pell. Ben will continue to be our IT consultant as required.

Doug has initiated a number of funding initiatives as head of our finance group but is now moving on the vital role of organising and managing our volunteer work parties.

Leanda has taken on a new role in Healthcare but also continues to join our work parties.

Retiring Hon Sec John Rowe remains on Council and will be helping to establish regular guided walks along the canal within our events team to help publicise our work.

Please join me in welcoming four new members who were elected to Council. Steve Chapman and

William Matthew who both already make a huge contribution to our restoration work, Paul Armstrong our new Treasurer, and Mike Beckley who will become Hon Sec from December 1<sup>st</sup>.

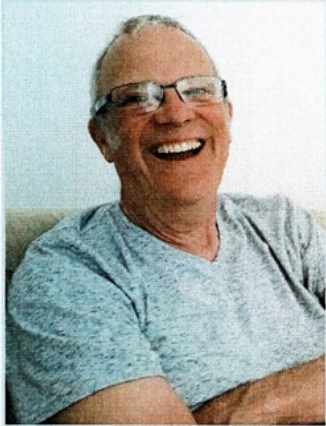

## Obituary: Clive Wilson *WAT Treasurer 2014 – 2021*



Died 1st September 2021, aged 78

We were very grateful when Clive answered our call for a new treasurer in 2014.

Clive was born in Northumberland in 1943 and had a brother & sister. He became an engineer and draughtsman, initially working for the MOD in Salisbury, rode a motor bike, married & divorced and finally settled in Potton, Bedfordshire.

A dedicated family man, he loved architecture and engineering ... but his real passion was sport.

Clive played Rugby, Golf & Cricket at different stages of life and managed a junior football team.

His athletic prowess playing cricket earned him the nickname 'Clive the Dive', but his greatest glory was probably playing for Herts Seniors in 200 games and scoring 5000 runs – a magnificent achievement - Well played Clive !

# Operations Report

This is a summary of Tony Bardwell's Operations Reports from August to October 2021, edited by Clive Johnson. The full reports can be read on our website. Our increasing number of volunteers have continued to make great progress by working 14 days each month, though this is also spending our available funds more rapidly.

## Entrance Gateway

Following another break-in, we rebuilt the gateway at the "cart-track" entrance from Little Tring Road.



The roadway is now straighter for larger lorries, and the footpath is safely and neatly fenced off as can be seen below.



## Pipe Capping

Our volunteers have **COMPLETED** capping the pipe to the point where it leaves the canal and cuts across under fields to the pumping station. What an achievement!



Widening the capping to form a safe dry access road in the bed, has proved so useful, that we plan to continue for the short remaining distance to the cart-track entrance.

The picture on the right shows the end of the roadway after the October work party, with the cart-track entrance and its new fencing visible in the distance.

Before laying the capping, we had to find the course of the buried pipeline.

We could normally do this by spotting which ground had been disturbed, but we

reached a section where we couldn't find anything. We discovered that when the pipeline was laid at this point, they had found it so difficult to cut a trench through the natural rock, that they chose to hand-tunnel through the softer ground below the rock.

This must have been at considerable risk to those who dug it. The rock was so hard that even a 13 tonne excavator with a narrow bucket could barely break it up.



## Animal Steps

We took the decision to introduce what we call “dog steps” some time ago. We also know that many other animals need to cross the canal, and some may fall in accidentally and need a way of getting out. The concept is simple. We put in a few rows of concrete blocks with every other layer pushed forward to make a step. Concrete has been used behind the “raised” blocks to make sure they stay put. When the canal is in water

the bottom step will be at water level. These features will be placed at intervals along the bank and at the ends of any bank structures.

Some concrete can be seen between the “steps” and the brick wall. It is there to make sure the Bentonite paste water seal, between the Bentomat waterproof liner and the wall, is protected from damage and doesn’t move in future.



### Bridge 4 Brickwork

After the October work party, our volunteer expert bricklayers had almost completed rebuilding the extensive brick remains of Bridge 4, and this will be complete by the time you read this.

The picture below shows the offside brickwork coming along nicely. The existing offside brickwork was so poor that it had to be mostly demolished, then rebuilt to match pictures taken of the remains.



## Re-lining from Bridge 4

Our volunteers have also started the next job, which is re-lining from Bridge 4 on top of the pipe-capping/ roadway. Before laying the Bentomat lining, we have to excavate more clay to create the required width and slope. We realised that once we had excavated the coal tar lining and any spoil on top of it, the clay underneath is “clean” i.e. not contaminated with coal tar. So we kept this clean clay separate, and have started to have it taken away from site at much lower cost than clay mixed with coal tar.

We are still perfecting our “Bentomatic” handling tool, so the Bentomat for this section was cut to size on the concrete canal bed, then lifted into place by excavator. This was relatively quick and efficient, and is expected to be quicker still with the Bentomatic. The picture below shows that lining the banks has already almost reached the first bend, Little Tring side of Bridge 4. Spoil still needs to be placed above the blocks.

## Clean and Shiny Underfoot

As the bridge 'matured' the plaques gained a discrete patina of old age, with scars from hob-nailed boots and general canal-side grit. That's a polite way of saying the plaques were getting into a messy state.

So we sorted the problem out!

Plaques on the steps on the towpath side (bridge 4) were the worst, presumably because it is easy to step on them. The plaques on the bridge span were not so bad, although one or two of them will need attention before long.

Once the correct anti-vandal driver was found, it didn't take long for the plaques to be unscrewed. In all, 15 step plaques were lifted, washed, and sent back to the manufacturers for repainting. Special care had to be taken to put plaques back into the same locations they were in originally.

The whole process was complete in less than 2 weeks (did anyone even notice they were gone?). Now the freshly refurbished plaques are back in place, ready for another 10 years underfoot.

## Wendover Work Party - Are these future volunteers?



Wendover Canal hosted the IWA Volunteering Day in August. This year due to Covid regulations this was adapted to a taster of 4 hours length. This attracted younger participants and was arranged on a Monday.

The day started by the required H&S talk, high vis, gloves and one 5 year old even wore his own hard hat. Then into bricklaying, this became quite competitive, with fighting for the bricks. But under Alex's expert eye, a sturdy good wall was built, albeit in the middle of the car park.



Then off for a stroll along the towpath, 7 children, 6 adults, 2 wheel-barrows and a push chair. There was a purpose. We were out identifying the **bug, bee, bird & butterfly** population, an added bonus, was a peer down a rabbit hole. Along the way we also checked out the flora and berries on the hedgerow, and some lucky children also managed to find a few tasty damsons to eat.

As the bookings were taken in advance, the younger compliment was known. This enabled Alex Melson IWA to hone in on the skills available.



He built a **Bug Hotel** and bought this along for the children to fill. So, after a picnic lunch sitting on the grass at Whitehouses, the children were dispatched with the task of finding twigs, hollow branches, dead grasses and any other material which they could fit into the **Bug Hotel** to make a comfortable home. Then, using second hand bricks from the canal they built a **Hedgehog House** and covered this with natural vegetation to encourage future tenants.





The day was **all go**, no time to dally, off went the contingent following the winding path along the woodland walk to the viewing platform. A short easy explanation of a pumping station followed, enhanced by Jenny Morris's recollection of clearing out the cellars during a WRG work party.

Finally, the children were given handfuls of wild meadow seed, this they distributed with gay abandon on our future meadow area (Tidy Friday work party had strimmed an area ready in advance).

As well as the publicity this gives The Wendover Canal, it encourages children into the outdoor environment. They all enjoyed themselves on this outdoor adventure. Hopefully they will make further visits to the area to check out any occupants in their **Bug hotel & Hedgehog House**.

Upon arrival at Tiverton we were taken to the Grand Western Canal which extends for just over eleven miles and enjoyed a 2.5 hour cruise in a horse drawn barge - one of the last in Great Britain. The weather was perfect, as was the scenery, and a snack lunch was provided with the bar open throughout the trip. We then travelled to our

hotel, the Castle in Taunton where the drinks waiter spilt an entire tray of drinks over me - fortunately I had spare trousers and the hotel kindly arranged for dry cleaning and onward posting to my home.

Saturday morning was an early start owing to a sudden timetable change by the West Somerset Railway

### Volunteer - Information Manager

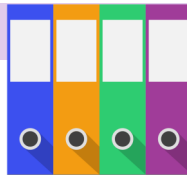


We are looking for one or two volunteers to help us with on line digital storage of our documents and pictures and to keep them secure but accessible when required.

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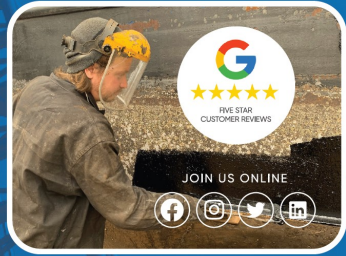
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
