Fund-raising returns

Aldbury Fête raised £105 excluding sales of Grand Draw tickets **Rickmansworth Canal Festival** raised £197, excluding sales of Draw tickets.

With the latest donation of £107 **Rose Bennett's bric-a-brac stall** at Dunstable and District Boat club has now raised a total of £2114 for WAT.

Thrupp Canal Cruising Club's 'Charity of the Year' has so far raised £415 for WAT **Restoration Open Day** on 7 June raised £209 in donations, £136 in sales and £554 in refreshments. Grand Draw ticket sales were additional to this.

CHAIRMAN'S COLUMN

Another milestone has just been reached in our restoration – over a quarter of a mile of newly re-lined canal near Drayton Beauchamp was re-watered on 11 April – the first time it has been in water for over 100 years. This is a tremendous achievement and a great tribute to all our enthusiastic volunteers past and present who have toiled in all weathers to make it happen – a huge thank you to you all. Many were present as Roger Leishman and Ray Orth made the final cut in the bund.

It was sadly not possible to make this a major event not only because it would have been impractical given the confines of the narrow towpath and lack of car parking but also as the precise re-watering date was finalised at short notice in conjunction with CRT to take advantage of favourable water flows from the Wendover springs.

However we were delighted to welcome many members and supporters to our Restoration Open Day on June 7 based at Drayton Beauchamp Church to see the new section in water and to see members of Chiltern Canoe Club enjoying paddling on the water – another first.

Parties of visitors were taken along the towpath to see the new section and on to the current work site where work is proceeding to continue capping the pipe under the canal bed as a prelude to profiling and lining the canal bed. This will enable us to achieve our objective of restoring the Wendover Arm to navigation from Bulbourne Junction to the A41 bypass and a new winding hole to turn boats. At our next Open Day on Sunday



6 September we hope to have Chiltern Canoe Club with us again plus a group of paddle boarders courtesy of CRT.

'How long will it be before its finished?' is the question we get asked most frequently – the answer will depend on two things – first and foremost attracting more volunteers to help carry the work forward and secondly raising sufficient funds to pay for the materials and plant hire needed.

Seeing the project develop and especially being part of it is extremely rewarding whether working on the canal bed or in the many support roles which help to oil the wheels – if you are able to help us towards our goal do please get in touch – thank you.

HERITAGE LOTTERY FUNDING PROGRESS

On Friday 1 May at Green Park we met with James Clifton and Richard Baker of Canal and River Trust. Others present were Victoria Ireland, our professional fund-raiser, together with Chris Sargeant and Nigel Williams.

The object was to begin the fine tuning of a Stage 1 Application in the hope that this could be submitted by the next Heritage Lottery Fund deadline of August. However, much work remains to be done and we may miss this date but, if so, we are hopeful that the next deadline of November 2015 can be achieved.

Although our application is being led by CRT and although we have Victoria helping us there is still a lot of work to be done, Our appeal to you is that if there is anyone out there who has experience of constructing funding applications and who could help us in this specific task we would be delighted to hear from you. March and April 2015

The completion of the bund in Bridge 4A narrows at the March working party allowed us to cut a channel through the bund at the end of Stage 1 and, at 11am on Saturday 11 April, start the flow of water into the next 450 metres of restored canal. A total now of 750 metres out of the 2,058 metres in Phase II, (36%) is in water if we exclude the length from the sump at Drayton Beauchamp Bridge to Saxonway Bridge that was always in Phase II.

The re-watering was not an overnight event as it took about a couple of weeks for the 3½ million litres to flow down through the already restored sections before the final Wendover water level was reached – see timelapse pictures on p11 and on the front cover. All seems well, except for the expected slight weepage the bund is holding.

The re-watering was not made a major event for various reasons including not knowing for certain whether there would be enough water flowing from Wendover during this rather dry period. It was mainly attended by restoration volunteers and a few invited guests including our President, David Fletcher.

In April the first length of pipe capping from the manhole east of the bund was cast and this work will proceed during the rest of the year.

In April also the new cabin to be erected at Whitehouses was delivered and Tony

Bardwell will be in charge of laying a base and putting the flatpack hut together during the May working party.

If you cast your mind back June 2013 issue you will remember that Phill Cardy brought along several young trees that Margaret Leishman has been repotting and tending. They are now 4 to 6 feet tall and at the April working party they were planted on the Herts County Council land farmed by their tenant farmer, Keith Slade; this is where we tipped surplus spoil and we were asked to reinstate the trees that had to be removed to facilitate the tipping.

May 2015

The new 'site hut' was erected at Whitehouses and pipe capping continued, 27.5m now completed.

We held discussions with CRT, Keir (CRT's contractor) and KESCRG to discuss the works to be carried out at Whitehouses in July and August.

June 2015

This was a curtailed work party over the weekend of the Restoration Open Day to show our visitors what we are now doing.

The task for the next three months is to continue the pipe capping towards Whitehouses. Tony Bardwell is in charge of the Working Parties in July and August and would be delighted to hear from you if you can help. Contact Tony through the Trust's general number (see p2). As was highlighted in the spring Newsletter, to maximise the effectiveness of the capping task we ask for volunteers to specify dates on which they will attend (rather, please, than a vague, 'sometime during the week'.)

Financial status report

The Trust has now spent over ½ million pounds on Phase II. This is quite an achievement especially when you add the Phase I cost, a grand total of £909,360 in 18 (financial) years. Just over £50,000 a year

What is also remarkable is that, bearing in mind the Trust has £400,000 still 'in the bank', £1,309,360 has been raised by the Trust since 1989 of which only about £310,000 has been in the form of grants and a bequest, i.e. the Trust has raised £1m to date plus the funds required for the non-restoration costs of running the Trust!



Evelyn's War

Evelyn Hunt was one of the waterways' 'Idle Women' – women narrowboat handlers – during WWII. A recently discovered diary of hers has been edited and serialised by Tim Coghlan of Brauston Boats and we are delighted that Tim has given us permission to reproduce it. The part below relates to Evelyn and her crew's stay in the Marsworth area over the August Bank Holiday 1943.

The sections in italics annotated 'Ed' are Tim's comments.

Friday, 30th July 1943 Bottom of Marsworth

Once again a terribly hot day, though it had cooled a bit by the time we started on the locks but when we reached the bottom of Marsworth at about 9.30 pm. we were grateful to the kind Americans, only this day arrived in England, who appeared at the boat-side with a pint of beer for each of us. We tied comfortable in the bend, just above the first lock and intend to picnic and bathe and enjoy our 3 days holiday here. Last night we couldn't find Ike (Ed: The cat) and this morning he still hadn't appeared, so I walked back down the Northampton Arm locks to find him, calling as I went. The man at the bottom house hadn't seen him, so I went on down and at last by No. 13 lock, I heard a dreadful wailing and there was Ike, wet and miserable, coming out from under the swing bridge. He was terribly pleased to see me and we thought it would teach him not to get off the boat in the locks, but no! A few locks further up he got off the boats again and I would have left him behind if I hadn't noticed him. The boat people will think us mad spending our holiday in this quiet country place when we might have gone on to Berkhampsted and the pictures. They think we must be staying here

because of the Yanks! Most of the boats we met were making for Leighton.

Saturday, 31st July 1943 Bottom of Marsworth

(Ed: The following Monday was to be the August Bank Holiday – then held on the first Monday in August. Despite there being a war on, everything, including the Marsworth Top Lock, would be closed – except the pubs! The printed diary heading for the day reads interestingly: 'Game Certificates and Gun Licences expire/Trinity Law Sittings end' such were the priorities of life on the home front – including continuing to hold bank holidays. The Sicilian Invasion was now in full flow having begun on 9th July. But Evelyn no more mentions it than Jane Austen wrote of the Napoleonic Wars, waging across the Channel in her writing days - other than meeting army officers, or in Evelyn's case, the recently arrived USAAF Eighth Air Force, which was taking over the Cheddington Airfield from the RAF, to fly Consolidated B-24 Liberator bombers.)

The first day of our holiday has been fun – a very hot day, ending with a crazy swim in the Reservoir with two Americans! Anne let down the boats badly, we thought, by going for a midnight walk with one of them in her natty pyjamas after the bathe! But I cannot say I was much better, though, as I stayed by the boats with one of them. Audrey and Ken were in the hold, so what a party!

(Ed: Ken Williams was qualifying as a doctor in Birmingham and met Audrey during her nursing training. They married after the war and both are still alive in their nineties now living in Tasmania.) Ken had arrived at about 6 o'clock, and Anne and I met him first, on the towpath, as we were talking to some kind fishermen who were giving us fish for supper. We met one of them in the White Lion at lunchtime and he promised us some fish then, and later in the day renewed his offer and most kindly played fishmonger and scaled and gutted them for us. He was a nice little man who had been a sailor before the War and who had tattoos on his arms The White Lion ran out of beer soon after 6 o'clock, so after supper we went

Monday, 2nd August 1943: (Bank Holiday) Bottom of Marsworth

The last day of our holiday – tomorrow we must start at 5.30 am to get up to the locks before the bottom lock is opened and the crowd comes through. There are numerous pairs of boats there today, waiting to come up in the morning – some pairs empty, some loaded and Mr James' beer boats are there too. How shall we ever wake up

so early after lying in bed so late for 3 mornings? Anne and I did some slight exploring on our bikes this evening. I have lost my purse and we started by going to lyinghoe, where we went at lunchtime for a drink, to see if we could find it, but no luck! So we biked on to Wilstone Reservoir, round through Tring and back along the Summit by the towpath. In the evening we went for a last bathe in the Wilstone Reservoir. It was a bit on the cold side, but it was

exhilarating and worth the first agony of going in. It is a wide, open reservoir with a concrete wall round half of it, and they tell us it is free from sewers, which is comforting. After we had bathed in the Marsworth Reservoir they told us that Tring sewers flowed into it! So choice! We walked up the locks later in the evening and found the pounds full, though there was still a strong smell of dead fish

Burgundy, the new Blue!

The standard colour for new WAT clothing is changing. The stock of old blue sweat, polo, and T-shirts was running out, and Council felt that new sales channels (post, on-line), and a new supplier would allow us to introduce a new colour as standard. Burgundy was chosen to avoid confusion with IWA. CRT, and other groups. A supplier was selected who can deliver quite quickly. Quality is deemed more important than cost; we are not trying to compete with High Street shops or other clothing brands, but rather to offer a good value product at an acceptable price, and branded with our WAT logo.

Existing blue garments of course are still valid and 'official' – we even have some still available on our shelves at a reduced price (ask for details) so you don't have to throw away any blue shirts still in the wardrobe. However when that polo or sweatshirt need replacing, our clothing range is now in the single colour burgundy, with attractively embroidered silver logo. One exception is T-shirts which are in white with a burgundy logo (do keep up!).

So what do we have? We don't have all the garments in all the sizes, but we can probably supply your choice from size S to 2XL, or 3XL in T Shirts, Polo Shirts, and Sweatshirts, made by Fruit of The Loom©. In addition we have Peaked Caps (baseball style) to keep the fierce British sun out your eyes. Each item has two prices: an On-line price including banking costs post/packing costs and any VAT, and an Event price. For garments it is expected that most purchases will be

in person at the various events we go to. That allows you to try for size, if you are not sure. As an example, a Polo Shirt costs £12 when taken away from an event, compared to £16 online, thanks to postage charges, etc.

In 2015 WAT will be at the events listed on page 22 with a full range of available stock so, come along and buy what you want without having to pay p&p. A quick enquiry by phone or Email beforehand will tell you if we have your size. Why not take a look now online at www.wendoverarmtrust.co.uk/shop to see the range?

Newly introduced (or more honestly, newly discovered) is a limited supply of cruising plaques. Introduced to commemorate the re opening of Little Tring Bridge in 2005, these green painted brass plaques show a graphic of the newly restored end of navigation, and the words 'Navigation to Little Tring'. We used to ask for photographic proof of navigation, but your word will suffice. Of course if you do send us a photo of your boat going through Little Tring Bridge, it may appear in our magazine or website (photos need to be of reasonable quality, most picture formats are acceptable but please at a resolution of 300dpi so that they reproduce well; pictures taken on mobile phones are no good).

So how do you want to pay for your on-line purchase? If you have a PayPal© account, use that. If not, you can pay by Debit/Credit Card. The transactional cost, as well as post and packing is all included in your price.
