Chairman's column

Lottery Bid Update – at a stakeholder meeting on July 28th at Milton Keynes with James Clifton, Charles Baker and Sarah Brown the following points were reported:

C&RT has submitted initial information relating to stage 2 development and expects HLF to release the first 50% tranche of development funding 'within the next 2/3 weeks' along with permission to start on the development phase. Once the first 50% has been used, a further 40% will be released with the final 10% at the end of this phase.

C&RT aim to complete briefs, activity plans, tenders and quotes for works by April 2017 and to submit to HLF by autumn 2017 (the expiry date for this phase is currently 31 January 2018 after which the grant would lapse). An HLF decision to go to the delivery stage would then be expected by spring 2018 with a construction start date in summer 2018.

The first 50% of WAT's matched funding contribution to the development stage (\pounds 5,600) will become due in November 2016 with the balance due in the spring of 2017.

Sarah Brown has now joined the C&RT bid team to be responsible for drawing up the required community engagement plans.

Volunteers from the Trust will be required to help during the delivery stage to document progress, conduct



walks and talks, and keep photographic records as work proceeds.

September this year is a busy time for the Trust, beginning with our Open Day on Sept 4th, the Lord Lieutenant of Hertfordshire's visit on Sept 6th, and HLF's visit on September 29th (see details elsewhere in this issue) plus our involvement with C&RT's 'Two Arms on Two Legs' half-marathon on September 11th plus Halton Fête on the same day.

Thank you to all who have offered to help already but more hands will make for lighter work so please do help us spread the load – all of these activities will benefit the Trust and its objectives. If you can offer to help in any way just contact me directly:

VISITS TO THE ARM

LORD LIEUTENANT'S VISIT

The Lord Lieutenant of Hertfordshire, Lady Verulam, together with her Deputy Mr Derek Townsend have accepted the Trust's invitation to visit the Arm to see the work of the Trust and its achievements so far. This will create publicity opportunities for us.

The visit will be on 6 September and all our volunteers have been invited to attend. Should this Newsletter plop onto your doormat by then and you're free, we'd welcome any of our other members to come.

The proposed programme is:

- Depart on Michael and Marion Birch's narrowboat Dragonfly from Bulbourne at around 9.30 am. On the boat will be the Lord Lieutenant and her deputy, Restoration Director Roger Leishman, James Clifton from C&RT, who is leading the HLF Bid on its behalf, Chris Sargeant, WAT Chairman plus Marion and Michael as 'crew'.
- Cruise along the Arm the 1½ miles to Little Tring, disembarking around 10.15 am there to meet Ray Orth, Deputy Restoration Director, Council Members and the Trust's volunteers.
- Walk along the towpath to see the present works in action plus the site of the former Whitehouses pumping station, which will now become a vital water control point

for the entire Tring summit area of the Grand Union Canal.

- Meet representatives of C&RT who own and manage our Canal network.
- Unveil a plaque on Bridge 4 commemorating the event.
- Return to Little Tring and thence by narrow boat back to Bulbourne estimated arrival at 1.00pm.

This is a great opportunity for us to show what has been achieved over many years and where we are going – lets enjoy it together.

Please note: parking close to the Arm is limited. There are a few spaces by Drayton Beauchamp Bridge, public car parks below the reservoirs at Marsworth (charge) and Wilstone (free) and a few spaces by Little Tring Bridge. If you are local and can walk there that would be much appreciated.

Stout footwear is recommended.

Green Park is not licensed so you are welcome to BYO drinks (and glasses.)



Gift Aid — Again!

Gift Aid is important to the Trust in that, if you pay enough tax it enhances your donation by 25%.

What qualifies as a gift?

- You are a UK resident.
- The money you give is your own you can't donate on behalf of someone else and then claim Gift Aid.
- You don't get anything in return for your donation – small tokens aren't classed as 'something in return.' Your subscription to WAT is allowable for though you receive the quarterly

Newsletter this is classed as 'material for promoting the objects of the Trust and is thus is allowable under Gift Aid rules.

• The donation is not to buy a sweepstake, raffle or lottery ticket. Grand Draw tickets or subscriptions to Club 100 can't be Gift Aided.

HMRC is tightening up on Gift Aid claims to try to weed out spurious declarations which is why we've been batting on about it for a long time. Katherine does need to have a current declaration from you so, if you haven't yet filled in the form that's been sent to you and you do want your donation to be Gift Aided please, please, please fill it in and return it.

Further, if you made a Gift Aid declaration and no longer pay tax it's your responsibility to tell the Trust. In particular we've had a couple of instances recently where the donor has died; the rule is that donations in the relevant tax year up to the date of death are allowable for Gift Aid – the donor's family or executors do need to inform the Trust though.

Now the twist:

The Government introduced a Personal Savings Allowance in April this year. Good idea as it eliminates a lot of hassle for banks, building societies and HMRC – and for you if you are on limited income since you no longer have to claim to have interest paid gross. But (and there's always a 'but') there will be a negative effect on Charities from people of limited means who used to donate with Gift Aid. Why? With your personal allowance of £11,000 and the zero-rated interest allowance of £5,000 and the new personal savings allowance of £1,000, if your <u>taxable</u> salary-income, pension and savings is less than £17,000 then it's unlikely you'll pay tax and donations can't be Gift Aided. You can still donate (yes, please <u>do</u>), it won't cost you a penny more than previously but the Charity can't Gift Aid it.

A further complication is that the Chancellor replaced dividend tax credit with a £5,000 Dividend Allowance. This tax credit was in effect tax you'd paid although you hadn't (no it's not quite Alice in Wonderland!) and you could use it to Gift Aid donations, now you can't.

So, add up all your <u>taxable</u> income and if this comes to less than £17,000 and any dividends you receive are less than $\pm 5,000$ you will almost certainly pay no tax and if you've declared for Gift Aid in the past you need to tell Katherine that the declaration is void.

RESTORATION NEWS

From various sources including Roger Leishman's restoration group's newsletters

May and June 2016

Good progress was made on the pipe capping towards Bridge 4 during the month and is rapidly approaching Bridge 4. At the June working party we received a delivery of 18 rolls of Bentomat[®], the first delivery since 2008!

We were joined by the Kent & East Sussex Canal Recovery Group in May and they excavated the underground chambers recently found at the back of the Whitehouses. They uncovered many bottles etc. that contained unknown substances. From what we now know. at one time a chemist was the occupant of Whitehouses cottages and the bottles may have contained chemicals for his 'homework'. We decided to treat the bottles as hazardous and in consultation with C&RT moved them to Little Tring for tests by a specialist and subsequent disposal. More on this Whitehouses story in a later issue of Wendover Arm News.

July 2016

Bridge 4 lining and stop planks

C&RT's civil engineers have defined that the requirement for the stop planks in the bridge 4 narrows is simply our standard technique of 150mm flat concrete through the narrows (to obviate

'scour'.) No slot is required to accommodate the king post and the galvanised stop-plank grooves were cast into the walls when the narrows were constructed.

Lining at Whitehouses

After discussion with C&RT we agreed that the towpath side of the lining through Whitehouses will be 150mm concrete rather than 300mm spoil over the Bentomat[®] for the length of the wharf wall, and

the pipe capping will be 150mm higher than normal (as for bridge

narrows). On the offside/wharf side we've been concerned that there is not navigable depth over the brick foundation that extends under the settling tank behind the wharf wall. (refer back to the picture on p13 of the summer 2016 issue if you're not sure what this is.) C&RT has come up with a very practical solution; it is to build a pseudo-weir along the edge of the shallow water that will protrude above water level and prevent craft grounding. This can also include screened apertures in it to prevent debris entering the culverts and settling tank.

Capping progress

Good progress was made in July and we are less than 40m from Bridge 4. We hope to have completed the capping up to the bridge narrows in August so that The work is not yet scheduled as it is very much up to the vagaries of the English weather but is expected to be the completion of the pipe-capping to bridge 4 and rough profiling of the banks to there and the continuation of profiling and lining on stage 3.



we can start the re-lining process at Bridge 4a in time to demonstrate it at the September Open Day. We plan to cut Bentomat[®] pieces for this during August.

Funding for the Future

Many of you may think that if we get the HLF Grant (and we trust we will) then that's an end to it, we can all breathe a heavy sigh of relief, job done, cruise the Arm, enjoy it. NO, NO and once more NO.

Why not? Let's assume that HLF grants us the money:

- The Trust has to put in 15% of the grant money from its own coffers – the Lottery doesn't give you the lot! That will be £300k of our £400k Restoration fund committed.
- The remaining £100k (well, actually £75k as we've money to pay C&RT for materials already purchased) firstly has to fund the completion of stages 3 and 4 between bridges 4a and a bit beyond Bridge 4. This work needs to be done before the contractors move in to complete the job (early 2018?) and will cost significantly more than the £75k we've got.

 Years ago £30k+ came each year from the Festival and interest rates added quite a bit to our capital. Sadly now the Festivals are in the past and returns on secure investments are pathetic; unless we can generate more revenue or find funding donors we are likely to have a shortfall.

Membership fees, Club 100, Restoration Open Days, the Grand Draw and some donations/legacies keep us ticking over but we need more.

Small-scale events (e.g. coffee mornings) we or you can organise are great but we need to think on a larger scale than this. Do <u>you</u> know of any corporate/social/ public or charitable donor that we could approach. Let us know if you do and we'll follow it up. Council is actively engaged on this at present but there could be many potential sources of funds that we've not come across.

At the end of Phase II that's it? Once again, 'NO', is the answer. We've got to start soon on the planning process for Phase III and this will need cash. all get our boats to Wendover (yes, more likely than the proverbial flying pigs squadron!) is that it? NO again. The Trust will still have a reason to exist to promote the amenity, environmental, educational and employment benefits of the Arm and this will need funds to support that work.

Adopt a corner?

We visited Lindengate at Wendover, a charity that takes patients in need of therapy. Its aim is to improve their wellbeing through gardening and we hoped it would be possible for them to adopt the corner of land behind the rushes at Little Tring winding hole and keep it maintained as a picnic area. Unfortunately they do not go out into the community, as they have five acres to plant and restore at their base by World's End.

However there is the opportunity for another organisation to adopt the area, and possibly other areas along the canal. Get in touch with us if you know of anyone be it a charity, or a commercial organisation that wants to increase it's social responsibility portfolio, and we'll follow up.

From the Archives

FUNDING THE FUTURE

Part 2 of Mike Chessher's reports on his attempts to put together a Millennium Lotttery Fund package to finance restoration (Wendover Arm News No 19, Spring 1995):

British Waterways

The next step is to approach BW. Without their whole hearted support, I might as well stop and wash all that mud off.

Now you might be forgiven for thinking that they'd leap for joy if somebody comes along proposing to increase the value of their assets But look at it from their point of view. They already have 2000 miles of waterway to maintain at a cost last year of £58.5 million The last thing they want is a few more miles of canal to look after and, remember, all over the country there are groups just like us bearing such a gift. Fans of the 1968 Transport Act will remember that the Arm is a remainder waterway, which means that BW can only spend money on keeping it as it was then. In practical terms that means money for maintaining the water supply, for safety, or investment they can gel a commercial return on.

Anyhow, I digress, possibly to put off telling you that BW have done their sums less optimistically than me, and come up with a staggering estimate of 9 to 12 million pounds for total restoration Furthermore, on the awkward question of revenue funding – maintenance to you and me – it becomes obvious that the cost of maintaining a navigation is much greater than maintaining a water channel or pipeline.

BW promise to refine their figures but I go home feeling very depressed and sink into a bath wondering why it is that some people manage to restore canals a lot longer than this one!

Back to BW

Decide that half a canal is better than no canal but can't see a way of dressing up restoration as far as the A4I as a millennium project. Besides, there is no provision for a winding hole – no wonder the committee all have short boats! Out come the maps and the midnight oil. Decide that Green Park is about as far as we can go financially at this stage and about the least we can do to make a viable destination for boaters. There's a car park with wheelchair access to the towpath, lots of trees, a nature trail and some land the County Council might let us have for a winding hole.

Get out the calculator and do a serious breakdown of Atkins' figures, adding extra money for improved lining and raising the A41 culvert, then hit the phone to BW. English Partnerships and all the local councils, BW come up with their refined figures and they are down to £8.6 million for the whole arm, but as far as the A41, we are only £60,000 apart – and my figure is the higher one!

Yes, there's a chance we can do it It *is* only a chance mind you, but a better one than buying lottery tickets.

My early boating years, part 2- onwards to Carianne

A later outing in 1965 required two boats. Apache and Colette the latter was re-named *Septic* by one of the party who claimed it better reflected the overall offering. I recall having some seventeen passengers on the two boats. This required two additional tents and the second night was spent on the Old West River, somewhere near Holywell, again with a camp fire with the portable record player blasting out the Beatles' Ticket to Ride and other current tracks. Little movement was evident before about 10am the following morning and a minimal 'wash and brush up' was the order of the day followed by breakfast of sorts. By the time the crew had re-assembled we realised that we would be travelling in darkness for part of the homeward stretch. With the light fading rapidly, two members with torches were positioned on the bow whilst the Captain and others endeavoured to keep the boat midstream

By around 11pm we were still some distance from the Boatyard and, in those days, weirs were not adequately marked or bollarded. We had a very severe scare when a weir suddenly appeared and frantic shouts of 'reverse' were heard. Somehow, the engine managed to bring the boat to a halt and we continued without further danger, finally arriving at the Boatyard around 2am – this would not be permitted nowadays! Trips were arranged for the Easter, Whitsun and August Bank holidays for several years. On three-day trips we usually reached Ely, some 43 miles from Tempsford, but had to refill with petrol at the local Boatyard. I seem to recall a gallon was around 5/-(25 pence).

By the end of 1965 the price for a 3day trip was £2.14.0 (£2.70) per head.

In 1966 I hired a four berth cruiser from Tewkesbury Marine Services on the River Avon named *Gay Gamble* (can you imagine a boat with this name

nowadays?) and we reached Pershore before turning round and venturing onto the River Severn, mooring at Upton upon Severn and then handing back the boat at 9am sharp the following morning! Subsequently boats were hired from Saint Line Cruisers on the River Marne in France, Wyvern Shipping at Leighton Buzzard, Western Cruisers of Stratford, English County Cruises at

Wrenbury, Maid Line Cruisers (when a group of six cruised the Birmingham canals), the Narrow Boat Company at Wooten Waven, Charente Plaisance on the River Charente also in France, and a terrible company called Putois at Beeston Wharf when we cruised the Llangollen Canal but needed to bail some 42 buckets of water daily to keep afloat! Two days after we returned my wife shouted 'look at the TV quickly!' The evening *Nationwide* programme was

exposing the standards together with numerous complaints from customers and the company was out of business within weeks. Of the above companies only Wyvem Shipping is still in business and they are great supporters of WAT. I remember hiring their largest boat, a 70ft wooden narrowboat, named *Hazel*, which I recall slept 10/12. We decided to venture down the Aylesbury Arm but after the first four locks were confronted with a completely dry canal! Someone had left the paddles open overnight on several locks so we had no alternative but to reverse back to the junction.

Following a spell of dinghy sailing around the East coast rivers with an 'Enterprise' which I purchased with an old school friend, I decided that the two-and-a-half-hour journey to the sea was becoming increasingly tiresome and in 1990 ordered a new 50ft narrowboat from a builder in Northwich, Cheshire, completed in the Spring of 1991. The journey home to Cowroast

Marina at Tring comprised some 120 locks and took ten days of hard labour in somewhat inclement weather. With a sixteen and a seven-year old on board the journey was somewhat stressful, suffice it to say that only one of my two children has ever been on board again! I have this boat to this day, and with numerous improvements over the years, have been informed that it is worth very nearly what I paid for it – somewhat better than car depreciation!
