

RESTORATION NEWS

June 2017

The month started with the work party demonstrating restoration techniques to visitors at the June Restoration Open Day and then for the rest of the week the work cracked-on to make everything ready for BITM to come the weekend after the work party: their task was to lav some 3000 high-density blocks and 37 coir rolls to line both banks on another 56m of canal. They must have worked with a fury for your editor walked along the canal on the Sunday afternoon intending to take pictures of the operation in progress only to be met by a disconsolate Peter Lockett, who had visited for just the same purpose, with the comment, 'They've finished!' However pictures you've got, thanks to others and the Trust's grateful thanks go to BITM for their sterling efforts, we bet that worked up a thirst or two!

July 2017

Having laid the blocks the task for the July and August was to lay the Bentomat® lining on the base of the canal, backfill on both sides and the base and get ready to resume lining in time for the visitors at September's Open Day.

After a dry spring and early summer the rains returned with a vengeance in July

Operation floodwatch

CRT has revived the idea of gradually raising stop planks at Drayton Beauchamp Bridge so as to monitor the effect of raised water level back to Wendover. As reported earlier the first

of the stop planks have been inserted, the second is due imminently and CRT has asked WAT if it can assist with manpower to help them.

Super Service!

One of our excavators started to give problems on Saturday of the June work party. Still problematical on the Sunday morning Ray called SRBE the plant hire company. Initially promised a response early on Monday morning, the mechanic decided not to wait but come out immediately so we had fully-working equipment again by lunchtime.

Whitehouses

CRT now have a design for the wall in front of the culverts. Apart from a couple of small issues to resolve it seems we may be close to agreement on the final design – and work can then begin.

HLF update

Bucks Archaeological Society is to survey the old swing-bridge abutments at Whitehouses prior to their being sympathetically removed. There is the potential for their reuse on a nearby interpretation panel Samples of the infill at Little Tring compound (the 'tip') have been taken and sent for analysis to determine the disposal route for the material once it needs to taken away as a precursor to restoration.

Ecological surveys continue: there are badger runs across the dry section and there may be the need to provide a badger tunnel – or adapt Bridge 4 – for their use.

It was noted that gabions and rock rolls between Drayton Beauchamp and the A41 have slipped.

Not HLF, but there are reports that Buckland Parish council has £28k of section 106 money and would like a timber bridge from the towpath to their land, it could provide a canoe launch point.



Fund-Raising Update

The Trust is delighted to announce that it has received a bequest from one of the Trust's supporters who recently passed away; the Trust also hopes that it will benefit too from the residual estate. Apologies from Council as it has known about this

MAJOR LEGACY received.

for some time, but it seemed to it to be inappropriate to make the announcement before the bequest was received. The sum so far? £150,000.

What does this mean? Having had to ring-fence some £300k of our funds for the HLF matching sum, the Trust was looking anxiously at its reserves and its cash inflow in the context of completion of the works at least up to and including Whitehouses by the time the hoped-for HLF work commences. It now has sufficient to do this work plus some of the other things that we will need to do, or contribute to, in the future. As examples:

- as part of the HLF bid precursors, CRT/WAT commissioned an accessibility audit. The auditor very quickly produced a 76-page(!) report highlighting areas where we need to improve our response to disability discrimination legislation.
- HLF requires us to demonstrate our community involvement, not just until we receive a grant but a plan that goes forward years after the actual spending of the money on the restoration has happened.

This will not be without cost.

- part of the response to community involvement must be the provision of adequate facilities for visitors. Those of you who know the Arm will appreciate that there are no refreshment or toilet facilities near to it and car-parking is inadequate to say the least. You may ask whether this should be the responsibility of CRT once the Trust has achieved its goal of water all the way to Wendover but we urge you to remind vourselves of the Trust's objects (printed on p 22) and that the Trust works with CRT, not separately from it.
- When there is a navigable channel through to the A41 a proper winding hole there has to be constructed – engineering works at a cost.
- ◆ Easyfundraising: As we go to press the number of WAT supporters is 62 and the total raised is £1422.20. The No1 supporter has now raised £283.96.

GOLDFIELD SCHOOL VISIT

As part of the 'Activity Plan' for the Heritage Lottery Fund bid, four volunteers arranged to spend a morning at Goldfield Primary School at Tring. The activity plan requires WAT to reach into the community and publicise the benefits of the canal. It especially focuses on young people as they are the future. Through a volunteer we heard that Goldfield School were concentrating on water and its many themes during the spring term. We felt this would be a good opportunity to spend time with the children.

We were allocated two classes of 5 and 6 year olds. We dressed in authentic canal wear for the 1900, with bonnets and aprons for the women and waistcoat and cap for the gent. We also covered the restoration, so John wore his hard hat and high-viz. jacket.

The morning started with a ten-minute Powerpoint presentation, showing a map of Tring with the closeness of the canal to the the school and the topography of the Tring summit with locks along the Grand Union Canal. We gave a quick history which included pictures of horse drawn barges, and colourful narrow boats with their small cabin quarters as an explanation for the following activities.

Each class of 30 children were split into three groups, where the following activities were tried in turn, brass rubbing, lace plate making and a fishing game with an environmental theme. All the children enjoyed these hands-on tasks. Beryl Hunter quizzed the children about their knowledge regarding the items found in the canal and reinforced the need for no

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litter as this affected the wildlife's survival.

The session ended with a short updated presentation showing the current restoration with its plant of diggers and dumpers, and we encouraged the children to bring their parents for a walk during the first weekend of the month, so they could watch the restoration in progress.

To end, we highlighted the SAFE campaign *Stay Away From the Edge*, covering the dangers from playing around next to waterways.

We asked the children what they understood by the word volunteer, one young man put up his hand and said, 'It is the first in the queue to try something'. Well yes, but it also covers many aspects of modern life in which the willing public gives its time for free.

As we went to leave the children presented us with bunches of daffodils, very appropriate from the GOLDfield School.

A WENDOVER TIMELINE - PART 1: 1720-1800

An edited version of Barry Martin's archive notes on matters relating to the Wendover Arm

1790: Oxford Canal, 230miles in length with 100+ locks opens to provide a waterways route from Birmingham to London

1792 April: James Barnes of Banbury is commissioned by the 1st Marquis of Buckingham to do an initial survey to find this more direct route 1792 July: A public meeting in Stony Stratford examines Barnes' survey and approves it enthusiastically.

A Committee with William Praed MP as its chairman was set up with the remit to apply for an Act of Parliament. A subscription list was opened and large sums of money promised in support of the venture.

James Barnes draws up detailed plans, which were then examined by William Jessop

1794: Royal assent given to the Act enabling navigable cuts to Buckingham, Aylesbury and **Wendover**.

One of the proposed alternative routes for the (GJCC's) main line had been from the Oxford Canal via Aylesbury, Wendover then onwards to London. The GJCC came under pressure to have the Wendover feeder extended fully into Wendover; the Company rejects this scheme.

Sir John Dashwood, having agreed to a feeder stream now find himself with a fully navigable canal passing through his estates, Gerard Lake, Lord of the Manor of Aston Clinton found likewise which is why the towpath changes to the side away from the manor houses from Halton Bridge to the A41

1799:GJCC connects the canal between Brentford and Tring Summit.

Water mill at Gamnel purchased and demolished to augment water supply in the Arm.

December: John Westcar took an ox by boat from Wendover Wharf to the first Smithfield show. The animal stood 6'7" tall and weighed 241 stone and fetched 100 guineas

1720: James Fermoy sells Halton House, the manor and a watermill to Sir Francis Dashwood (1st baronet) for £19,000

1791: The search begins to find a more direct route from Birmingham to London, the 'as-the-crow-flies' distance is only 105 miles

1793: Praed's Act received Royal Assent in April, the basic route of what was to be known as the Grand Junction Canal (GJCC) had been agreed. Four branches were authorised and also the building of feeder streams.

Work began at Brentford and Braunston in May.

A reliable source of water was needed to supply the canal summit near Tring. The River Wendover was a suitable source and with the help of the 1st Marquis of Buckingham the GJCC purchased the water rights. The plan in the original 1793 enabling act was to build a feeder along the 390ft contour from Wendover.

Construction of the feeder began in the autumn. Additionally the GJCC purchased a mill in Wendover (Manor House Mill?), another mill owned by the Marquis of Buckingham at Weston Turville and a third mill at Halton owned by Sir John Dashwood –King (3d baronet); Sir John also consented to the water feeder passing through his garden and Halton Village

1796: The Arm is complete (allegedly)

1797 (15 March): the Company Minute Books report the Wendover Arm as finished

1797/8: Weston Turville reservoir constructed to supply 'compensation' water to mill owners in the Aylesbury area who had lost water when the River Wendover was rerouted

1800

The timeline is marked at approximately 10-year intervals

Grub-up! - the Editor's cookery column

At last, for my fans (and, yes, I do have at least one) enough space in this issue to give you another of my tried-and-tested recipes.

This one is my take on an horrendously calorific unnamed dessert that's a favourite of the people of Meiringen in Switzerland (where meringues were invented and where Sherlock Holmes had his final battle with Moriarty). It's a wonder that eating this, the Swiss aren't all roly-poly but, then, they've got all those mountains to climb to work off any excess haven't they? Since it hasn't got a name let's call it

SHERLOCK'S REVENGE

Ingredients – for four

4 x merginue nests (I cheat and buy mine; if you can get them from Meiringen, so much the better.) 100g cream cheese (Philadelphia type) low fat if you wish.

1 x level teaspoon icing sugar, sieved 150g summer fruits: strawberries or raspberries or loganberries.

4 x scoops vanilla ice cream

Method

Beat the icing sugar and cream cheese together. Should the mix liquefy, let it stand for 20 minutes and it will have re-solidified. Spoon into the meringue nests and plate up..

Decorate the top of the filled nests with the fruit (if strawberries, cut into quarters) Cook remaining fruit and sieve to make a purée, sweeten to taste and reduce if runny over a low heat.

Place a scoop of vanilla ice cream next to the filled nest, drizzle the purée artistically on the plate and serve with a fan wafer.

FROM THE ARCHIVES

From Issue 1 of the Wendover Arm News

The formation of the Trust

The former Wendover Arm Group (WAG) was wound up in March 1989 and is assets were donated to the new Trust. For those of you who have not been too involved with these events perhaps I should explain the difference between WAG and the Trust.

WAG was an informal gathering of representatives from other local organisations such as the Grand Union Society, the Aylesbury Canal Society, the Inland Waterways Association, the Chiltern Society, etc. At various times Local Authorities, British Waterways. The Nature Conservancy Council, local MP Robert Jones and others joined the Group's meetings in order to promote the restoration of the Wendover Arm.

Very early in WAG's existence it became apparent that there is a lot of local support for the restoration of the Wendover Arm with many individuals seeking to join the Group. Because WAG was not a conventional society in this sense, we were unable to accept these prospective members. Also very early on, WAG realised that it would have much more credibility with those Authorities who, once convinced of the value of restoring the Arm could really help to make it happen, if it was a formally constituted body.

For these reasons, steps were taken to form a Wendover Arm Trust and it was decided that if this was to be really effective it should be done with registration under the Companies Acts and with the Charity Commissioners. However, no-one on

WAG realised how long the process of achieving this status was going to take. All this is now in the past. On 28th February 1989 a Certificate of Incorporation was issued by Companies House followed on 20th March 1989 by the issue of a Certificate of Charitable Status from the Charity Commissioners.

The Trust exists for the purposes of promoting the restoration plan as vigorously as possible and to raise the finance to pay for it. It has already been demonstrated that it is much easier to get financial assistance from other sources if you can show that you have already raised significant sums by your own efforts.

Fund-raising becomes a priority with approaches being made to various grant making bodies, local companies, etc, and it is here that the accountability under the Companies Act will give the Trust a credibility that WAG could never achieve.

As the Trust approaches its 28th AGM it's interesting to look back to the beginning and recognise that much of what Ian wrote in 1989 is still true today. The Trust has achieved much over the years; it has re-built a bridge that should never have been demolished; provided a winding hole for full length boats; prevented the extinction of a navigable waterway with its representations over the Aston Clinton By-pass and has built, or has had built, over 2km of waterway. That we raised the money ourselves, mainly through the Festivals and legacies (with, interestingly, little coming from grant-making bodies) and have achieved this should make us all proud and we trust that it will have great weight when HLF comes to consider the details proposals to 'wet' the 'dry' bit.

But. . . and there's always a 'but'. we must not rest on our laurels, there's more to do and we need to continue to raise funds.

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
