Wendover Arm Trust helps build local partnerships

At the recent Parliamentary reception hosted by The Inland Waterways Association (IWA), Leanda Richardson from the Wendover Arm Trust met with Jo Henderson, the IWA's new Media & Campaigns officer who was talking about the charity's annual Pull Snap

Stomp campaign which looks to eradicate Himalayan balsam. The Wendover Arm does not suffer from this

non-native invasive plant, unlike many other waterways that are being overrun by it. Leanda mentioned a link with Puddingstone Distillery based in Tring, which produces the artisan gin brand 'Campfire Gin'. Each year, Puddingstone produces a limited edition run of Himalayan balsam Campfire Gin which has become a firm favourite amongst gin connoisseurs. Puddingstone Distillery originally produced the gin in partnership with the Herts & Middlesex Wildlife Trust, using the Himalayan balsam the volunteers were clearing from their sites. They were so successful in their clearance that there is very little Himalayan



balsam in their area this year. This meant that Puddingstone were looking for other areas where Himalayan balsam grows.

Leanda put Jo Henderson and IWA in touch with Puddingstone Distillery and the rest is history. The first Balsam Bash where IWA will collect blossom for Puddingstone Distillery took place on 13 July, 2019 in Aylesbury. It was a pull that was run by the River Thame Conservation Trust on Bear Brook, a small tributary to the River Thames, which is completely covered in Himalayan balsam. From that one discussion with Jo Henderson, Leanda's networking has led to relationships being built not only with IWA, but also Puddingstone Distillery, Herts & Middlesex Wildlife Trust and the River Thame Conservation Trust.

The more local partnerships that <u>limited-editions-gins/</u> can be developed, the more

Making the impossible possible!



Roger Leishman, 87 this year, has just retired from his role as Restoration Director for the Trust after

devoting over 24 years dedicated to restoration of The Wendover Arm.

Mooted in the 1960's through IWA and Grand Union Canal Societies, Ray Orth recalls meeting Roger in 1993 during early undergrowth clearance.

In 1995, recognising his extensive civil engineering background Roger became Work party Coordinator and Council member.

The demolition of Little Tring bridge in March 1973, considered unsafe by the local council, had completely severed the canal and in 1996 council asked Roger to lead moves to reinstate it.

With BW engineers and surveyors, ill defined canal boundaries were established and following much negotiation and fundraising, work began to rebuild the bridge in July 2000.

Restoration also began from Tringford Stop Lock to the



Winding Hole and Roger became restoration Director.

Finally 6th March 2005 this phase was re-watered, a tremendous milestone and the Trust.

March 28th 2005 saw the first boats through Little Tring Bridge in over 100 years led Roger Lewis's Aramis and Roger and Margaret Leishman's May Beth—a fitting tribute.



Getting the Bridge reinstated truly made the restoration a possibility once again.

Roger moved on to ensure the new A41 by pass did not compromise the canal, through patient negotiation with all parties. Provision for the adjacent Winding Hole was included.

Becoming Vice Chairman he also received the IWA Christopher Power Prize in the recognition of his contribution.

More problems overcome included developing capping to protect the under bed pipe, installing footbridges to accommodate footpaths across the canal and through trails establishing sound lining procedures for the canal.

"I for one consider working with Roger over the last 25 years has been an honour and privilege , a great learning opportunity and a very enjoyable experience."

Operations Report - June 2019

<u>Health and Safety</u> We had a minor injury to a finger this month. This was caused by being trapped between two concrete blocks whilst they were being laid. The result was a small flap of skin on the fingertip. The wound was cleaned up and bandaged. Apparently, healing is going well.

We move and handle many concrete blocks and there is little scope for changing the method or introducing handling tools beyond what we already have. Unless anyone has any bright ideas? The view from Bridge 4 (several views this month.)



The main thing to note is that the lining is now right up to bridge 4. Despite storm Miguel the spoil available to back fill the banks was far too dry to allow it to be placed to the correct thickness. However later in the week we had lashings of wind and rain but too late to help us. The exposed Bentomat will withstand some weathering and we will cover it up next month.

As can be seen in this picture and the next is that the lower edge of the mooring wall has now been

exposed ready for the bed lining to be laid and blocks put on to the mat. The line of spoil that can be seen was placed there for next time in the hope that it will have soaked up the "right "amount of moisture so that we can use it to backfill the bank. In this view the soil on top of the mooring wall has been scraped back and levelled to start creating a grassed area. Most of the scrub and dead wood has been removed. The remaining desirable trees have been reduced in height and "pollarded". New trees



have been planted and lots more are due in the Autumn. The point where the towpath lining has been stopped is where several features meet up. There will be concrete, and block work to connect with the pipe capping, the bridge bed and the bank lining blocks. The Bentomat will be tailored round the various features as we go.

Landscaping with Tidy Friday

Work continued on the whole area, stretching from the mooring wall right back to the Whitehouses compound. The previous pictures show the extent of the works. Also, as can be seen in the view above, that hard work has now created the start of a grassy picnic/mooring area.

The grass area around the Little Tring Winding hole and the "Oak tree" was cut back and tidied up.

Other things

We are considering another two-week work party for July. An extra week could be added after the advertised dates. This would depend on the level of volunteer support indicated.
