Bridge Handed Over

If you drive from Tring Northwards through Little Tring to Marsworth you will notice nothing unusual near the hamlet of Little Tring. A quick glance to the right just before you approach the houses reveals the stop lock at the navigable end of the Arm.

A glance to the left shows the towpath

wall being built. Nothing unusual - but, look again. You might notice the new brick walls and parapets. That's about the only evidence from the road of a major civil engineering work.

To get a proper appreciation of what has been achieved, you should stop well before the houses, get out of your car, and walk to the embankment and down the steps.

You will see a fine new brick arch spanning the dry bed of the canal in an elegant span. Your eyes should also be drawn to the plaque marking the rebuilding of the bridge by BW, funded entirely by WAT.

The plaque was officially unveiled at the start of the May 2001 Festival by the well-known actor and

canal enthusiast, David Suchet. The unveiling followed a simple ceremony when Trust Restoration Director Roger Leishman handed the bridge over to Dr David Fletcher, Chief Executive of BW, both of whom praised the co-operation between the Trust and BW.

The ceremony was attended by many of the Mayors and Chief Executives of County and local authorities, and other invited guests. In all approaching 100 people were there to see the ceremony, and subsequently to view the Trust



Little Tring Bridge was demolished in 1973 amid concerns over safety. In fact the original bridge which had stood since the Arm was first built at the end of the 18th Century was so strongly constructed, it was only demolished with difficulty.

The bridge you see today was designed by British Waterways and built by Priory Construction Ltd to reflect as far as possible the original design.

The construction is of pre-stressed concrete on mass concrete abutments, and is faced in hand made local brick, chosen to match other canal structures.

The rebuilding of Little Tring Bridge was entirely paid for by the Wendover Arm Trust, from funds raised by individual donations and from proceeds of Canal Festivals, held annually close to this spot.

Completion of Little Tring Bridge marks the first major step in the Trust's work to fully restore the Wendover Arm to navigable standards.

The completed bridge was formally handed over to British Waterways on May 27th 2001, and this plaque unveiled by Mr David Suchet.

A permanent replacement for the temporary plaque will be fixed to the towpath wall - when it is built!


Signature Sale!!

set a precedent and standard of cleanliness that will be hard to beat..





Little Tring Bridge Wins Awards



The new bridge at Little Tring has won two design awards.

The Chilterns Conservation Board and the Chiltern Society. made the award in their Chilterns 2001 Buildings Design Award scheme.

On May 4^{th} John Savage for WAT accepted the certificate from personality Lucinda Lambton, who coincidentally lived as a child in the cottage alongside the lock.

The award cites the 'construction of a canal bridge, with vision and commitment to its design, use of materials and high quality of workmanship'.

Within BW there is also a design award scheme, and John Kearsey,

BW Engineer has disclosed that Little Tring Bridge has recently won the BW Regional Environmental and Heritage Award.

John has good reason to be proud

- his design input was crucial to the construction and building of the bridge. The experience gained by BW and its contractors in constructing LT Bridge, especially the facing brickwork, has already been put to good use elsewhere on the system.

Footpaths And Rights Of Way On The Wendover Arm

Our Publicity Director, John Savage also has a keen interest in Footpaths and Rights of Way in the Tring locality. His summary of the various footpaths along the Wendover Arm is reproduced below:

From Bulboume Junction to Little Tring bridge the towing path is a Permissive Path (NOT a public Right of Way).

A Public Footpath (Number Tring Urban 52) follows the non-towing path side from the Tring Feeder to

Little Tring Bridge.

The towing path (yet to be reinstated) from Little bridge Tring to the access track just north of Little Tring is not any sort of path. It would be excellent an community/public relation exercise to persuade BW to dedicate this length as Right of

Public Footpaths Tring Rural 46 and Tring Urban 50 cross the canal to the north and south of Whitehouses respectively.

A path (NOT a public Right of Way)

crosses the canal at the site of the Halton Camp Railway bridge. This path is included in one of the Wendover Parish Council publicised circular walks (supported by Buckinghamshire County Council) the only non Right of Way to be so used.

Aston Clinton By-

Way when restoration is complete

Public Footpath Number Tring Urban 67 runs from Little Tring bridge on the nontowing path side for a short distance before bearing off left where the canal turns sharply right.

From the access track just north of Little Tring, the towing path is a Right of Way (Public Footpath) all the way to the terminus at Wendover. (Numbers Tring Rural 47, Drayton Beauchamp 14, Buckland 28, Aston Clinton 41, Halton 18, Halton 19, Weston Turville 36, Halton 19 and Wendover 12).

pass effects:

A Right of Way will be established along the towing path of the diverted section

The existing Right of Way will be maintained along the line of the old towing path on the eastern side of the new road bridge but the old towing path to the west of the bridge will be extinguished as a Right of Way. New sections of Rights of Way will cross the old canal line either side of the new road bridge to connect with the new Right of Way on the new towing path.

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
A Conversation with Roger Leishman

The name Roger Leishman occurs frequently when restoration matters are reported. Roger has been the Restoration Director of the Wendover Arm Trust for some years now. Under his leadership work is well underway to rebuild the first 300 vards or so of the

Arm. and the Trust took an active part in the design and preparation work leading to the rebuilding of Little Tring Bridge (as well as funding the work!).

Roger would far rather that we concentrate on news and issues than on personalities, but his name has cropped up often enough in restoration

reports to justify a closer look at the man behind the title.

So who is Roger Leishman, why does he do it, and what does he hope to achieve? Roger would be the last to make any claim to celebrity status, but nevertheless agreed to a Q & A style interview, as follows:

What qualifies you lead the restoration work?

R: I attended the oldest Public School in the Country, St Albans School, followed further bv education in Civil Engineering. My working life has been spent in very practical occupations. My railway experience stretches 38 years

from site engineering for marshalling yards via bridge building to railway workshops, until I retired in 1986. I have been boating since 1976, and my previous involvement with the upper Lea Valley Conservancy Group led me toward working with the Wendover Arm

large organisation? R: A key element is the knowledge that each member of the small team of volunteers who work with me on the restoration are self-reliant and able to work with little supervision.

Office' materials. (ordering letter writing, admin, etc.) now have to be done personally, with help from other volunteers. Let me take this opportunity to acknowledge and thank my wife Margaret for her help and support.

once

Why do you do it?

R: Basically for the gratification of constructing something of value, and being able to contribute my own skills and experience. I suppose you would call it 'Job Satisfaction'.

R: All the volunteers are becoming 'wrinklies', i.e. not in the first flush of youth any more. We are all conscious that regrettably few younger people are coming forward to volunteer. It is unlikely, given the limitations of budget and resources, that we will see the restoration completed to Wendover in the next few years. Consequently we try to be realistic in our expectations. For my part I am looking forward to the completion of Phase 1 (from the stop lock to a new winding hole beyond Little Tring Bridge). That will take the next 2 or 3 years, after which I hope to take a less 'front-line' role in the restoration.

How do you place the WAT restoration work in relation to other restoration projects?

R: In some ways we are a jump ahead of many projects. For example, we developed a safety culture embodied in our safety manual that has been taken as a benchmark elsewhere in the canal community. We also share our experience with other groups that we have visited, and we also gain from their practical experience thereby saving both time and money for WAT. I remain a member of several restoration societies, partly for the cross fertilisation of ideas. However it is clear to me that each restoration project is different and carries its own problems and solutions.

In terms of the restoration, what are you proudest of?

R: Of course, Little Tring Bridge is a magnificent and lasting achievement for the whole Trust. However, the bridge is a 'thing'. I am most proud of something more intangible – the teamwork that has developed within the Restoration Group, and which has contributed so much to our high quality work and accident-free record to date. If, however, you insist on something 'concrete' that I am proud of, I would point to the aesthetically pleasing curved towpath wall that we have constructed entirely by hand.

Correspondence

Wendover Arm News does not receive much in the way of correspondence, but occasionally an issue arises which warrants putting pen to paper. The following letter was addressed to British Waterways earlier this year, and copied to WAT:

23rd June 2001

Dear Sir/Madam,

I am writing to express my concern at the deplorable state of parts of the Wendover Arm of the Grand Union Canal. In particular the stretch adjacent to my property.

The water is so choked with weeds that the young moor hens and ducklings are able to perform 'biblical feats' of walking ON the water. Sadly due to the disgusting behaviour of persons unknown who use the canal as a general waste bin, there is a resulting accumulation of rubbish entangled in the weeds. This not only presents a hazard to the wildlife, but creates an appalling eyesore.

Were I a younger man I would be prepared to tackle the problem myself, as I have done in the past, but feel it is beyond my capabilities, particularly in view of the depth of the water since the heavy rains of the winter months.

I am hoping that the British Waterways Board can at least do some minimal clearing allowing the water to flow and thus enhance a very popular stretch of the waterway.

The following reply was sent : by British Waterways

12th June 2001

Dear Mr Dyson

Re: Weed problem along the Wendover Arm

Thank you for your letter raising concerns at the state of the Wendover Arm at certain sections. There is a management strategy for this canal, which does include the spraying, and removal of weeds within the watered section. The chemicals used in this process have been fully approved by the Environment Agency and do not cause any harm to the habitat in which they are applied. However, as an extra

precaution British Waterways have delayed spraying until the glut of the breading, nesting and growing season has finished. We do have planned in the Wendover Arm work programme to spray the weeds in early September. This however is being monitored, as we do not want a repeat of the blooms encountered in 1999. There may be cause to spray the weeds earlier than this to ensure the water channel remains in flow.

With regard to your other concern the litter problem has been noted and local staff will be going on site to drag the litter away. This will also be addressed during the spraying contract, as the litter needs to be removed prior to spraying. The local British Waterways operatives will be on site to remove the litter as soon as they can.

I hope this has addressed your concerns and the moorhens return to their normal avian feats as soon as the weed have been removed.

GIFT AID REPORT

Gift Aid money 'accruing' for this year totals nearly £1,100 Some of this money we could not claim last year because Gift Aid Declarations were only recently signed and returned. So far, 210 Gift Aid forms have been returned out of 331 memberships eligible for the scheme. We have 2 Gift Aid Declarations from non-members, and 34 memberships still with Deeds of Covenant 13 Corporate memberships, and 1 Family membership in the USA, are not eligible for Gift Aid.

A41 Bypass Started

Work has started on the Tring Interchange for the new Aston Clinton Bypass. Contractors Balfour Beatty will need access across the Wendover Arm to continue with the work, so the building of the bridge is expected early into the two year contract. Measures to reduce the impact of traffic noise will include an earth bank alongside the new road, and a noise abatement screen on the North side of the new bridge. The bridge, although of concrete construction will be brick faced, in a similar way to Little Tring Bridge, perhaps with the same Ember Blend bricks..

Council Matters

January

Council received a presentation from Ian Lauder, a professional fundraiser.

> Little Tring Bridge rebuilding is progressing. BT ducts have been included into the structure.

> .It was decided to book 3 x 6 metres display space for the National Festival in Milton Keynes..

February

> Ray Orth will write to all members asking for help with toilet cleaning duties at the National Festival in August.

> Arrangements were discussed for the hand over of Little Tring Bridge at the Tring Festival.

Restoration for Phase 2 (Little Tring to the A41) is estimated at £500,000.

> The Trust information leaflet has been updated.

> The IWA have agreed to releasing the Wilkinson Award in stages.

Only 900 yards remain to be cleared (de-stumped) at Drayton Beauchamp.

> Two footbridges will be needed between Drayton and Little Tring.

> Thanks to recent rain, the shallow section between the Wendover and the A41 is close to navigable depth.

March

> Herts County Council refused a donation to offset the additional cost of building a wider bridge with footpath.

▶ BW will carry out a Foot & Mouth risk assessment for the Festival.

> The bridge ceremony will be a 'hand-over' of the bridge to British Waterways. > David Suchet has agreed to be present.

➤ WAT will assist with information for the Berkhamsted Festival organisers.

> The cost of restoration to Wendover has been revised to approximately \pounds 1.5million, using volunteer labour.

Shelley reported on progress with a new Trust booklet. Quotes will be obtained for design and printing.

April

> ADAS have carried out a Risk Assessment on the Festival. The Festival will take place, subject to suitable Foot & Mouth precautions.

Restoration work is 4 months behind due to adverse weather and F&M restrictions..

> The A41 Aston Clinto Bypass has been awarded to Balfour Beatty..

May

> Arrangements for the bridge hand over ceremony were discussed.

> WAT will make two presentations at the National Festival in Milton Keynes in August.

> The text of the plaque to Tim Wilkinson was circulated for later discussion.

June

➤ Companies House have a problem with the Trust's returns for 1999/2000. John Brooman is busy liasing with Co. House and our Auditor.

Total Festival income was £53,748 with 9,313 tickets sold.

> David Suchet will be offered honorary membership of WAT.
