Council and Committee Changes

Resignations from Council by key officers have prompted a review of operations, and a re-assessment of how we conduct the business of the Trust.

Members of the Completion Committee have done a valuable job in terms of investigating background issues.

However, it has proved difficult to properly coordinate the activities of the Restoration and Completion Committees, and avoid duplication of effort. Council has agreed that the future work of the Trust is best achieved by integrating the work of the Completion Committee into Council or other Committees.

Effective as from January:

- The Completion Committee itself is wound up as a separate body, with its members joining one or other
 of the Committees, or Trust Council.
- Trust Council remains as the main governing body of the Trust.
- The Restoration Committee has expanded to take on board some of the members and functions carried out by the former Completion Committee.
- A Fundraising Committee will concentrate on identifying sources of funding, and issues needing resolution before funding can be requested.
- Our Festival Committee continues as before, arranging and organising our single biggest fundraising event, with a contribution of £20,000 to £50,000 per year to Trust funds.

With the revised structure in place, some important positions are unfilled, and Trust members are asked to consider volunteering to fill the 'empty chairs'.

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Canal Festival

The Canal Festival had to be cancelled half way through in 2007, thanks to the terrible weather. As a result we did not benefit from the normal income, and in fact we suffered a relatively small loss (just over



£500). In the circumstances we were fortunate as our loss could have been much more. Some of our visiting traders were not as lucky as they lost their marquees and stands. However most gave us their support and said they would be back for 2008.

Preparations for the **2008 Canal Festival** are well advanced, with the event taking place over the Bank Holiday Weekend of Sunday 25th and Monday 26th May. Bookings are being taken for Boats, Trades, Crafts and Charities, and the weekend's entertainments are also well in hand. Restoration - Where are We Now?

Although the 2007 Festival was a great disappointment, the bright side is that we are at last making progress on the Phase II re-lining.

As you can see, the first 60 metres of experimental section at Drayton Beauchamp is in water and we believe we now have a design and procedures in place to make real progress.

Bulk excavation and pipe capping of Stage 1 is now 2/3 complete and the first half of the excavation for the first mooring bay has been completed despite the weather.

If you attended the AGM last October, you will have heard that the estimated cost of completing phase 2 has been revised upwards, by a significant amount. At the risk of boring those of us who are less than comfortable with figures, I have included the estimated costs for completing Phase 2, which is from the current end of navigation at Little Tring through to join up with the new section in water under the A41 Saxon Bridge. The figures are for the full cost of Phase 2, including monies already spent, and are as reported in October 2007. These are realistic estimates based on the construction methods currently employed.

Our income up to now relies heavily on the success of our annual Festival. The cancellation of the event mid-festival in 2007 was financially a slap in the face. In a 'normal' year we could expect an income of from £20,000 to £40,000 or more. However, even taking the higher figure, simple calculation shows it would take more than 30 years to fund the restoration solely from the Festival.

SUMMARY OF INDIRECT COSTS

Water from Wendover

Copies of Shelley Savage's excellent guide to the whole of the Wendover Arm are still available at a modest £4.95, plus £1 p&p.

The full colour 24 page booklet is A5 size, and makes a unique gift.

The guide describes sights and signs along the route of the Arm, with each page complemented by historic and other background information.

Colour and archive B/W photos abound. Three suggested walking routes are also described in detail.



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Future Work Parties

The use of tracked dumpers, although expensive, has meant that we have been able to keep working despite atrocious conditions along the temporary road in the 'dry' canal bed. It has enabled us to take delivery of ready-mix concrete on both Saturdays and Mondays hence speeding up progress. Up to 30 metres of pipe capping can now be completed over one weekend, albeit the mud in places comes over the vehicles' caterpillar tracks.

Swan Upping

On the Monday morning after the September Working Party Weekend a small group of volunteers gathered to tidy up the Trust's storage site at Little Tring. We were topping up the fuel tanks of the excavators and dumper trucks, and the gates were open for Morgan's low-loader to collect the equipment.

As we waited, we received an unexpected visitor; a young adult swan waddling unsteadily in through the open gate.

Three of the working party, led by Ray Orth, began to gently drive the swan back out of the site. The swan went a few yards and then sat down. It was gently stroked but refused to

move, so Ray tucked the swan under his arm and carried it into the

field next to the track which leads up from Little Tring Road.

The swan was gently deposited on the ground near two other young swans.

Ray recalled that he had noticed the 3 swans in the field on the previous day. We returned to the storage area to continue the clearance and tidying up.

About half an hour later we had three visitors, waddling line astern, along the track through the storage area.

The gate at the far end of the storage area was hurriedly unlocked so that the swans could gain access to the watered section of the canal. The swans were exhausted having walked about half a mile from one of the local reservoirs across rough dry fields looking for water (imagine walking half a

mile wearing a pair of rubber swimming flippers with no drinking water and you may have some idea of the state these young swans were in).

Each of the swans had to be carried by Ray several hundred yards through the storage area to the edge of the newly watered section of canal behind Little Tring Farm. The third swan had sat down in a large area of stinging nettles making Ray's task of lifting it especially difficult!

On reaching water, each swan drank heartily, and then headed for the planted area that was part of the Phase 1 restoration, where they were all seen to be feeding and regaining their strength.

During working parties wildlife is often rescued to prevent unnecessary risk from our restoration activities and many birds share our lunches.
