

## A Good Year for our Patron



David Suchet, recently awarded a CBE for services to drama, won the best actor award for his portrayal of Joe Keller in Howard Davies' West End production of All My Sons at the Critics Circle Theatre Awards this year.

Speaking to *The Stage*, David said: "This year, I celebrate 42 years as an actor so some of these critics, very senior critics, Michael Billington for example, have been reviewing me all my life and I am one of those people who does read reviews. 

# Club 100 Draw Winners — Winter 2010



# **Renewal Notice by E-Mail?**

In the current economic climate we all have to watch our spending, the Trust is no exception in that we are keeping a check on the amount it costs to run the organisation, in particular administration of our membership. Although the actual work administering the membership system is free as Katherine spends many an hour typing letters and updating the database, by far the biggest cost is postage.

For example, each renewal request letter that is sent out, costs around 40p (paper, envelope, ink and 2nd class stamp). 40p per membership household doesn't sound that much, after all a membership costs £8 for single or £12 for family. Over 1 year, this adds up to a massive £136.40 (we currently have 341 annual paying memberships who currently pay by cheque). Assuming each member responds and is sent an acknowledgement letter and membership card, this costs another £136.40. There is a cheaper and more efficient way to communicate with our members. EMAIL!!

We currently have a total of 463 membership households, so Katherine sends hundreds of letters over a year. The vast majority of the cost involved is for the postage stamps, which don't for-

get is money that you have given to the Trust so it can restore the canal, not pay hundreds of pounds a year to the Royal Mail for stamps. Royal Mail are increasing their prices again in April, so our costs will increase vet further. Would you like more of your subscriptions and donations to go directly to the resto tion of the canal? #### Government response

On 14 October 2010 the Government announced that British Waterways would be abolished as a public corporation and that we would create a new charity, similar to a national trust for the wa-Details of the public terways. consultation on the proposed model, including scope and governance, will be announced within the coming few weeks. The new aterways charity is expected to be set up in 2012, subject to Parliamentary consent and time.

A civil society model for British Waterways reflects the Government's commitment to Big Society, as well as its confidence in British Waterways to work with others to build a sustainable future for the waterways under a charitable model. A charitable company will give users and comcode 67957123. Please use your membership number as the payment reference. munities more responsibility for governance of the waterways. It also has the potential to enable the new body to access new income streams and greater public support at a time when there is considerable pressure on other sources of income. Charitable status would also facilitate a step change in volunteering, enhanced local partnership working and a range of cost efficiencies.

The Government will give the new charity the best start it can afford, with the transfer of the property portfolio and a long term contract. As a first step, the Government has provided a new long term commitment to a grant allocation at the 2014/15 level (£39m) to 2022/23 inclusive (covering the next two Spending Review periods) that will enable the development of a funding plan which gives confidence to the incoming Trustees of the new charity. The amount and length of the contract will be subject to negotiation with the Trustees, who will be appointed this April.

At a recent Restoration Committee meeting priorities and estimated funding were considered for the remaining tasks to complete the goal of building a navigable canal to Wendover.

### Completing Phase II

is was agreed to be top priority. Roger Leishman estimated, as things stand at present, the overall cost of this Phase would be in the order of £1m using volunteer labour. Taking into account spend to date plus cash in the bank and allowing for contingencies/ inflation, approximately £400k will need to be raised between now and re-opening, hopefully in 2018. The average annual spend will be in the order of £100k p.a.

This would re-water the whole canal but it would be at "Wendover level" from Little Tring upwards.

## ase III Bank Strengthening

To open Phase II to navigation at Tring summit level it is essential that any work needed to raise/ repair banks between Saxonway Bridge and Wendover is completed.

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Roger said that, at the meeting with British Waterways (BW) engineers the previous week, he had been asked if there was any way BW could help to ensure gravity feed from Wendover as soon as Phase II is completed. Roger suggested that this work could be undertaken by BW concurrently with the Trust's Phase II restoration and will write to BW accordingly. He also commented that he had suggested to BW using stop planks at Drayton Beauchamp Bridge to raise the water level to Tring summit level so as to determine the extent of the bank strengthening required as per the Trust's OPERATION FLOOD-WATCH.

It was also noted that there was interest in using the towpath as a cycleway and this would lead to raise towpath levels.

#### Wendover Basin

This covers clearance of the basin, including a mature tree in the bed and provision of moorings. It ranks low in priority, as it will not be needed until the Arm is open to navigation.

# Raising old A41 Bridge to give full air draught

At present the air draught above Tring summit level is 1.83 metres  $(5'11'_2)$  at the crown of the arch. Given that most pleasure craft have a curved roof and are kept to the centre of the channel this is better than some of the low bridges elsewhere on the system. However, if BW insists on the standard air draft of 3 metres, the arch of the bridge will require to be raised. The options are a) a brick arch bridge, b) a flat deck bridge or c) a metal lined arch as at present all founded on the existing abutments. It may well be possible to make this the lowest priority allowing restricted navigation until the funds can be raised?

## Halton Bridge

This requires rebuilding either a) as a lift bridge, b) as a swing bridge or c) as a typical canal bridge. Roger Leishman wrote to the Chairman of Bucks County Council in June 2003 (who had expressed interest when visiting the 2003 Festival) outlining the various options but had no response to his letter despite a follow up phone call. The letter also referred to the options for the old A41 Bridge above. A consultation was also held with the local residents on 16<sup>th</sup> October 2005 and their views are on record.

It was anticipated that this project would cost in the order of  $\pounds750,000$ .

## Phase III Dredging

This will be required from the by pass winding hole right back to Wendover. It was agreed that there was no point in progressing this work until the various obstructions to navigation have been overcome. Bridges require to be raised to permit the passage of dredging craft.

## Improving the narrows at Green Park

This consists of raising the present 7' 4" channel to above water level, a straightforward wall construction founded on the side shelves outside the main channel. This channel also emphasises the fact that the Arm, certainly above Little Tring was for 7ft craft only. Roger Leishman said that he had the old cross sections of the Arm and no way could craft wider than 7ft pass each other. The channel is 100 metres long; the work could easily be carried out by volunteer labour and must ideally be completed before the water level is raised to Tring summit level.

## Buckland Wharf Access Bridge

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Although not required to be raised for completion of Phase II, Roger Leishman said that there were good reasons for the Trust to give s priority on completion of Phase II. The intention, in agreement with the lessee and BW is to provide a new bridge alongside the present bridge (access has to be maintained to the adjacent properties) with a 7ft span close to the towpath bank.

Roger said that a budget figure of £100-200k should be adequate.

#### Environmental Impact Survey

Although the 1996 submission to the Millennium Lottery Fund included an environmental impact survey, this will require updating. It was agreed that this is pointless until Phase III is about to start, as any update today would require updating on completion of Phase II.

In conclusion the following priorities were agreed for the Funding Committee to action:

Priority 1 Completing Phase II

Priority 2 Phase III Bank Strengthening

Priority 3 Improving the narrows at Green Park

Priority 4 Buckland Wharf Access Bridge

All other items must be kept under review bearing in mind the lead time required for raising the necessary funding, surveying and outline design, planning consent, final design, letting of contracts and construction.

## **Restoration News**



Excellent progress has been made during the February and March working parties. The weather was on our side for the March working party it was clear, sunny and cool for the most part.

Pipe capping is coming on apace and is nearing the next goal of reaching the manhole adjacent to bridge 4A that is marked by the traffic cone shown in the pictures opposite. The pipeline is in the centre of the canal at this stage which means that no plant can get down to work on stage 2 until the pipe capping operation is clear of the bridge. Whilst that work is continuing work has resumed on the mooring wall on the off side of the canal adjacent to bridge 4. Three sections of wall and the last base section were poured during the March working party.

Scrub, stumps and young trees have now been cleared from the banks leaving stage 2 ready for bank profiling and lining.
