


#### Chairman's Column

Two days into the May work party, at the end of 11th May, I received a request from Canal and River Trust which led to my issuing the following announcement:

"Throughout our restoration we have always ensured that we adhere to relevant legislation, work closely with CRT, and have their approval for what we do and the methods used, CRT have asked us to pause work temporarily in order to carry out a joint review. The review is to ensure that current methods continue to meet latest environmental standards etc. This is being progressed as quickly as possible and we thank you for your patience and understanding meanwhile. We will keep you informed of progress."

Since then we have held a number of online meetings with key CRT contacts, however I am sorry to tell you that we are still not close to being able to restart. Since the June, July and August work parties were planned as a full fortnight, we have so far lost 7 weeks of restoration (and probably another 2 in September), at the time of year when ground conditions allow us to be most productive.

A key area for discussion has been the black substance containing coal-tar which the Victorians used to line the canal. CRT require further testing of



produces the expected results, which we hope to know by October, there will be some other CRT checks, but these will hopefully be concluded more quickly.

We have been making the most of this hiatus to carry out a range of ancillary tasks at Bridges 4 and 4A, plus those relating to maintenance and vegetation clearance. However we clearly want to get back to our core restoration as soon as possible.

We are therefore currently spending money more slowly than expected. But this is only a postponement and not a saving, because the money will still be spent at a later date. The target which we announced to complete lining by the end of 2025, has slipped into 2026.

We had applied to the National Lottery Heritage Fund for help from April 2024. They have told us that we applied too soon and have asked us to re-apply six months before we require the funding. So we shall be reviewing when this needs to be, especially in the light of reduced expenditure.

We have recently been in discussion with Dacorum BC about the status of our application for a further £180K on top of the £135K awarded in April

2022. We have every reason to believe that it will be approved, despite the change in overall control at the May elections.

We now have a trading subsidiary which is registered for VAT, named Wendover Canal Restoration Limited (WCRL). Other canal restoration charities have done the same thing for the same reasons as us: it enables us to claim back VAT on some bills we have to pay, such as when we pay FCC to take lorry-loads of ash away. It's been a lot of work over a long period, mainly for our Finance Lead Mike

Lastly we are very pleased that the towpath rebuild from Wendover to Halton is well under way, and Peter Elwin tells you all about this elsewhere in this newsletter. If you walk in the area, to the extent that this is possible, you will find that the upgrade is being warmly welcomed by residents and visitors alike.



#### Finance Review

The Trust income for the year ended 31st March 2023 shows a surplus of income over expenditure of nearly £43,000: however this year benefited from the receipt of £135,000 from Dacorum Borough Council for the removal of ash from the tip area. In fact much of the expenditure related to this activity was incurred in the previous year, therefore the two years should really be taken together to give a better view of activity. On this basis, funds available decreased over the two years by £K115, from £K514 on 1 April 2021 to £399k on 31 March 2023.

The costs of the towpath work during 2023/4 will not show in the WCT accounts as the funds raised will go directly to CRT (apart from a small amount of work undertaken by WCT volunteers)

#### **Operations Report**

This is a summary of our Operations Reports from February to July 2023, compiled by Clive Johnson from the monthly reports by Mikk Bradley. The full reports can be read on our website.

#### Wendover Towpath Vegetation



In addition, the vegetation was cleared at the Wharf Road entrance to the canal as shown above, allowing the canal to be seen from the road.

We were concerned that towpath vegetation between Wendover and Halton would delay the towpath upgrade until at least September, unless it was cleared before the nesting season. So in February when it was largely too wet to work in the canal, our volunteers did the necessary clearance along 2.7km. This allowed contractors to start work in June, and we were paid for our efforts from the towpath project budget. During our work, the towpath was kept open and there were many complimentary comments from towpath users.



#### Little Tring Towpath

A small amount of specific funding also allowed our volunteers to resurface a short length of towpath at Little Tring, as a demonstration of what could be achieved if funding were available. 180m of the towpath was excavated to receive 150mm of surfacing material. The specification was for MOT Type 1, compacted in two layers over a layer of geotextile. This work was started in February and finished later, including the application of finings to achieve a smoother surface.



Again the towpath was able to be kept open and volunteers received many complimentary comments and were asked when the next towpath section was going to be surfaced.

In March, 20 metres of the canal bed were lined with Bentomat and covered in spoil.





In March, April, and the first 2 days of May, a further 40 metres were excavated to the required profile, and the banks lined and concrete blocks placed in our usual way.



Background tasks completed since lining had to stop started with the installation of a memorial bench at the future site of the next winding hole near the Aston Clinton bypass. We then installed a monolith sponsored by IWA at Whitehouses.

#### Water Loss

Our repairs to the Whitehouses sluice were successful, however there is still a small leak at Bridge 4 which we have not yet had the opportunity to address.

#### **Tidy Fridays**

Numerous Tidy Friday tasks have been undertaken by the main work party team as well as on Tidy Fridays. For example, strimming around saplings and spreading wood mulch, painting the site huts, and mowing the paths at Whitehouses.

#### Wendover Canal – towpath upgrade June - October 2023

The canal towpath from Wendover to Halton is currently being upgraded by the Canal & River Trust and its

contractors Kier plc and Rothen Group.

This high-specification upgrade will result in an all-weather path of a width of 1.5m, or more where possible, together with bank reinforcing, a strong membrane, a solid foundation and a surface of Centrack, which is limestone-based, highly durable, widely used and particularly suited to this rural environment.

Bank work was started in early June and completed in July. This used Nicospan vertical liner held in place by posts and infilled with silt dredged from the canal. The foundation stone, consisting of 100mm (4") of Type 1, is

being laid stage by stage initially up to Perch Bridge, then to the centre of Halton; this is then followed by the

> laying of topsoil on either side of the path, a surface of 50mm (2") deep, sand-coloured Centrack and finally the seeding of the edges to encourage vegetation.

Sections of the towpath that are either being upgraded or needed for access are being closed in stages and then reopened to pedestrian and other traffic as soon as possible.

At the time of going to press the first 500m from Wharf Road to Walnut Drive has been completed and is open to the public. We are delighted that the project's objective will soon be met, which is to upgrade the entire 2,700m towpath all the way to the centre of

Halton. It really is a major project in its own right.

In parallel with this work new railings are being obtained for the canal and towpath at Wharf Road and new CRT signage for the entire length to Halton, all of which is planned to be installed this autumn / winter by WCT's volunteers.

Further details of construction methods can be found at Canal & River Trust, Rothen Group, Nicospan and Centrack web sites.

90% of the funding for this project has come from the HS2 Chiltern AONB Review Group, for which we have received excellent support from the Chilterns Conservation Board. In parallel with these and other discussions we have been exploring the possibility of receiving funding for additional stretches of the towpath from Buckinghamshire Council and Hertfordshire County Council.

#### Spot the difference



The difference is obvious. Because Terry has already told (or is happy to tell) WCT that Gift Aid can be claimed, WCT will get from HMRC 25% on top of whatever Terry donates, costing Terry nothing. i.e. Terry donates £100. WCT gets £100 from Terry, and £25 from HMRC.

Terry's donation does not have to match the winning amount. Whatever is donated, WCT will get 25% extra.

So what is the simple message here?

It is not expected, but nor is it uncommon, for lucky winners of the quarterly Club 100 Draw to 'give back' some or even all of the prize money. Using Gift Aid and making a donation separate to the prize receipt, the Trust benefits. A long explanation: By utilising legal and commendable tax legislation and rules\*, a donor can increase the value of their donation at no cost to themselves. They need only to be an existing UK taxpayer, and declare their willingness to participate in Gift Aid (ie agree the options on a donor form).

Short explanation: Register for Gift Aid just once\*\*, make your donation separate to your winnings.
